

COUNCIL MINUTES
MAY 13, 2020

The City Council held an electronic meeting through Zoom on Wednesday, May 13, 2020, at 5:30 p.m.

ADMINISTRATION AGENDA – MAYOR AND COUNCIL BUSINESS; STAFF

COMMENTS: ■Phillips – I want to thank the Police and Fire Departments for the great job they did in the incident a few days ago with the murder/suicide, they were very professional. Also, thanks to staff and administration on the great job in formulating the agenda. In Covid-19 times it is difficult to know where we will all be. I appreciate the budget that moves us forward but protects us. ■Melling – I had a citizen contact me, they were on a bike on Bridge on Center over I-15 on the road portion and had a near miss with a driver. I am not sure drivers are aware, but sidewalks are a dangerous place for cyclists. The road is narrow and there are other issues. I would like to look at putting share the road signs on that because we have a lot of students ride there. Paul – I think we have grant money to pay for that. Melling – I had a funeral director call me and was unaware, they wanted to buy a plot to bury ashes in the ground, new purchases that is not permitted, in talking with the funeral director it was cheaper to bury ashes in the ground than in the columbarium. I know there is a lot more to this, but I want to start the discussion on the reasons why we do things that way and look for things in the policy to adjust in concert with the funeral directors, so they know the policies. I would like to have the discussion in the next week. Paul – this is a decision the council made not too long ago. It is more expensive for the city to buy dirt than for the columbarium, that is why the fees were set and save the ground for those that want the traditional internment. If there is a spouse or relative you want to take with you when buried you can put that in with you. That was to direct folks using the urn over columbarium to save space. Mayor – this was a lengthy discussion in a council meeting and voted on by the Council. Melling – I explained that to the Director, but there was a lack of communication and pointed out

a few things that consumers would prefer and bring it in a closed setting to coordinate with people dealing with this as a living. Mayor – we will work on that, Tyler, Wade and Ferl can meet. Tyler – if you have changes you want made let me know. ■ Mayor – we had budget meetings the past two days, we appreciate our departments, council and staff for all your time and effort. There were a few community members that were there to see us go through this line by line. ■ Darin Adams & Todd Hageman – we want to talk about the closure one week for tomorrow for the Canyon View and Cedar High graduation parade. This is complicated. We have partnered with the School District and the law enforcement partners we will meet with next week. On 100 West N & S of Center will be the ingress for parents, CV from 200 North N. and Cedar West to Center, Canyon View turn left on MS to #2 lane and park as many as possible on 45-degree angle from Center to 400 South facing the route. We hope to mitigate and prevent accidents. Cedar High right on Main Street to 400 South. Once we get parents there. Law enforcement will shut the road at 5:00 p.m., at 5:40, Utah Barricade will close the roads, Todd will work with volunteers on no parking signs. Todd – Utah Barricade will pull all the signs and cone Main Street and put no parking on 200 South and 400 South and we have volunteers to help. Closure at 5:40 to be done by 6:00 to bring parents on to Main Street. That will be done in 1 hour and the parade will begin at 7:00 and conclude at 8:00 p.m. students will have a drive and come a route to get to the Parade Start point and we will bring the students out side by side on Center on Main Cedar Hill will turn right Canyon View left and go down the route. Phillips – will they be parked on both sides of the street? Chief – on both sides they will park angled on both sides. We have conceded a little bit, if we angle the parents they won't see as much so they will come in at a right angle. As the kids get to the end of the route, 400 S. and Main they will continue south on Main to the middle school. Todd – the detour will be the outside lane and the students will be corralled to the number 1 lane, so we don't cross lanes. There will be a check point to keep them in the cars. Chief – the Canyon View kids will go north when they get to Coal Creek officers and School District will push cars to the #2 lane and allow detour traffic on Coal Creek to allow traffic to flow. We hope to have great cooperation with parents and students. We know that it will be challenging so we will have parents and volunteer, my concern is when concluded everyone will want to get out of there. We asked the school to send out to parents to be careful, if there are fender benders the Police Department will not do reports. Todd – there will be a Gold Cross Unit and a wrecker on site in case. The School District is providing volunteers for parking and to encourage social distancing. Phillips – the parade is just cars passing, no floats. Chief – yes.
